The Big Horn County Fair will set up open classes in which anyone may participate. We invite you to enter this year's Fair.

RULES:

- 1. Fair Entries are accepted, without preregistering, on Tuesday July 25th. There is no fee to enter the Open Class of our fair.
- 2. Exhibitors must have raised or made their own products.
- 3. Exhibitors may enter as many lots as desired.
- 4. OPEN CLASS Exhibitors may bring their item(s) to the fairgrounds on Tuesday July 25th between 12:30pm-1:30pm.
- 5. Entry tags must be attached to all exhibits. These are to be picked up at the Registration table on opening day. You may be asked to fill out your own entry tags.
- 6. Members of any Organized Youth Group may exhibit items in any classes of the youth groups listed in this book.
- 7. Members of an Organized Youth Group are not limited to displaying items ONLY with affiliated organization. They may also choose to exhibit entries in any of the open classes 100-116.
- 8. Each Open Class exhibit will receive an appropriate ribbon according to the Danish Judging System. No premium money will be paid in the Open Class.
- 9. Exhibits must be removed by 3:00 pm on Saturday, closing day of the fair. Organized Youth Groups who have set up a club booth or display must check out with the Indoor Superintendent, Nadine Burke or Assistant, Anne Allen.




